

Fact sheet: Children and Homelessness

Children is one of the biggest groups experiencing homelessness in Australia, with 17 per cent of all people experiencing homelessness under the age of 12ⁱ. In Victoria children and young people under 18 make up 26% of people experiencing homelessnessⁱⁱ.

Why do children becomes homeless?

Children don't always identify themselves as being 'homeless' even when they're without secure shelter. For children feeling homeless can be about the absence of a sense of safety, security, place, and connection to supportsⁱⁱⁱ. Like adults, not all children will experience homelessness in the same way.

The causes of homelessness are complex, however for many children, homelessness is the result of family violence which typically involves a woman with children escaping a violent partner. Family Violence is the single biggest cause of homelessness in Australia.

Other reasons children become homeless is due to a housing crisis, inadequate or

poor housing conditions, parental substance misuse or parental mental health issues.

The impact of homelessness on children

Homelessness is associated with factors we know can have a negative impact on a child's development such as poverty, violence and instability.

Moving around a lot means it can become harder for a child to stay engaged with school. Children experiencing homelessness miss out on things that most children take for granted and are important in the developmental process, for example having friends over, school activities such as school excursions and uniforms.

Experiencing homelessness as a child makes it more likely that people will go on to experience homelessness in adult life. Around half the people seeking support from a SHS report that their parents experienced homelessness at least once. vi
